Changes in Guidance

Course Changes for Semester 2

Guidance will be working through the list of students who requested a timetable change via the Google form during the first two weeks of semester 2. Priority will be given to students needing a pathway change. It is important that all students attend the classes on their current schedule until they have met with a Guidance Counsellor.

Community Service Hours

This is a reminder to all students and parents that the Ministry of Education has provided flexible ways for students to obtain their 40 hours of community involvement, including:

- helping an elderly relative with an errand
- assisting a sibling with homework

- household chores
- up to a maximum of 10 hours from paid employment with proof of a paystub.

All students are strongly encouraged to take advantage of this opportunity to satisfy the diploma requirement to graduate. REGISTRATION NOW OPEN FOR SUMMER eLearning!

The Simcoe County District School Board (SCDSB) is offering summer school courses in July 2023 for current high school students or adult learners who are interested in earning a new credit or upgrading a previous mark. Students can advance online learning skills, earn missed credits or fast-track preparation for graduation or post-secondary in just four weeks. eLearning is fully supported by certified teachers who are available electronically daily.

SPECIALIST HIGH SKILLS MAJOR

What is SHSM? A Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM) that provides students with an opportunity to focus their learning and gain valuable experience for both work and post-secondary opportunities. Upon graduation, students are given a specialized red seal SHSM diploma and transcript which demonstrates they have learned the knowledge and skills of today's sector specific requirements. The program is open to ALL students.

BDHS has two different SHSM programs, CONSTRUCTION & TRANSPORTATION. The program requires students to complete a total of four grade 11/12 construction or transportation courses. Along with 4 supporting credits in English, math, business or science. SHSM also requires a total of 2 cooperative education credits linked to transportation or construction. In addition to the course requirements, students must complete a designated amount of compulsory and elected Sector-recognized certifications and/or training courses/programs along with experiential learning opportunities. NOTICE TO STUDENT AND PARENTS/GUARDIANS OF STUDENTS REGARDING OUT-OF-AREA REQUESTS:


Under Simcoe County District School Board procedures (APM A7000 – School Attendance Areas), it is possible for students to apply for and receive permission to attend an out-of-attendance-area school. Students will be permitted to continue in attendance as long as there are pupil places available. They may be required to return to their home school or transfer to another school when the capacity of the school they are attending has been reached and space is required for students residing within the designated attendance areas. An approval may be revoked at any time by the superintendent of education, after consultation with the receiving school principal, for reasons related to the student's behaviour, attendance, actions or inactions. Transportation to and from school is the responsibility of the out-of-attendance-area student and/or parent/guardian.

BLACK HISTORY MONTH:

The Simcoe County District School Board (SCDSB) recognizes and celebrates Black History Month every February. The SCDSB is committed to improving equity of access and opportunity for Black students, staff, and parents/guardians, and to creating a safe and caring learning environment that promotes the human rights of staff, students, and parent/guardians. Research Success @ Your Library

Our Learning Commons has purchased the rights for BDHS teachers and students to use a research model developed by Teacher-Librarians with the Toronto District School Board. Research Success is available to our students through our Google Classroom. It is a document of useful strategies and templates to guide and encourage critical thinking by students progressing through the exploring, investigating, processing and creating stages of the inquiry process.

Students are encouraged by this resource to think deeply about their research questions, source validity, note taking, and development of effective written and oral presentations of their findings. Moreover, Research Success helps students avoid plagiarism by presenting how to document sources in various academic formats. Students are led to personally reflect on their inquiry experience with a focus on improvement for their next research task.

Britannica School - Video for Parents

We have renewed our school's subscription to the online encyclopedia, Britannica School. As referenced in our November newsletter, Britannica is a valuable research and learning tool for our students. Access is provided through our Learning Commons Google Classroom (joining code: 6ieopgj) where our username and password are also provided.

BDHS ATTENDANCE REMINDERS:

Student Absences

If it is necessary for students to be absent from school because of illness or any other reason, they will be marked as an unknown absence until the absence has been reported to the school. The preferred method of communication for absences is through the attendance line 905-775-2262 option 1 or email bdhattendance@scdsb.on.ca. Absences reported to teachers via email may not be recorded as an excused absence and will prompt an automated attendance call home at day's end. Absences must be reported by parents/guardians until the student reaches the age of 18. Students who are 18 or older may have the privilege of signing themselves out. If the student signs out of school, they are expected to leave the school premises.

Appointments During the Day

Appointments happen and we are aware of that! However, to avoid unnecessary classroom interruption please provide as much notice as possible to have your student contacted and excused from the class. If office staff are given notice about an appointment, staff can email the teacher to have the student excused, rather than interrupting valuable teaching time with phone calls. Your co-operation with this process is appreciated.

Extended Absences

If you are planning to go on a vacation with your student or planning an extended absence from school (5 days or more), please have your student complete an extended absence form which are available in the main office.
